Nature Notes

Week ending 20th October 2024.

BIRDS

An adult male **Long-tailed Duck** flew on to Pilsey lagoon Thorney Island being pursued by a juvenile female **Peregrine** on 20^{th.}

Two **whimbrels** were on the northeast bund; and a **bar-tailed godwit** among other waders in the roost at the Hayling oyster beds on 15th. Both species were also present on 17th. Around 800 **golden plovers** were counted during the Thorney Island WEBS count on 20th.

Common and green sandpipers were seen on the Posbrook floods on 17th.

Two **great northern divers** were still in the north of Langstone Harbour on 15th. On 17th just one was seen but two were seen again on 21st.

There were 3 **great white egrets** on Thorney Island on 20th.

A white-tailed eagle was seen in the morning of 20th on the Thorney Island deeps. Two **ospreys** were watched from Black Point Hayling Island hunting over Chichester Harbour at low tide p.m. on 15th and 2 were seen during the Thorney Island WEBS count on 20th.

A female **marsh harrier** was seen over the oyster beds on 15th and 3 were on Thorney Island on 20th.

Two **ring-necked parakeets** were in trees behind the Hayling lifeboat station. This 11th record was the first multiple occurrence on this site..

Ring ouzels were present around Fort Southwick and on Butser Hill on 17th and 18th.

Yellow-browed warblers were seen on 15th in trees behind the carpark at the Hayling Island lifeboat station; and around Hammonds

Bridge on the Titchfield canal path. On 18th two were found in an oak in the Hayling Earnley Triangle before they moved into the Hollies caravan park. **Brambling** were also seen.

Rock pipits were on the sea wall at Portchester Castle, at the oyster beds and The Kench on 15th.

Two water pipits were flying and calling among meadow pipits over the field south of the Posbrook floods on 17th.

There were briefly 2 juvenile **hawfinches** in trees with chaffinches northwest of the carpark on Butser Hill on 18th.

BUTTERFLIES

Speckled woods and a **hawker dragonfly** were active in a Portsdown garden at the end of this week.

WILD FLOWERS

The **bladder senna** at the Kench has a single late flower now but plenty of seed pods.

OTHER WILDLIFE

Golden scalycap fungi were present on an old tree truck at Sinah Warren on 15th.
